Hailing from Gondia, Sanjeevani was struggling to read the words written on the blackboard, when she was in Class 6. The letters seemed blurred, and the pages were getting difficult to follow. Her teachers noticed the change.

Concerned, they suggested her to undergo an eye check-up. That suggestion would soon change her life. During a school screening program conducted by Orbis

partner, Sanjeevani was diagnosed with congenital cataracts in both eyes—a condition that, if left untreated, could have severely limited her future.

Under the care of partner hospital, Kalinga Eye Hospital & Research Centre with the support of Orbis, Sanjeevani underwent successful surgeries that restored her vision. What once looked like a blurry world suddenly became clear again. She returned to school with renewed determination, continuing her studies and pursuing higher studies in Pharmacy. Step by step, she built the life she once feared might slip away.

Today, Sanjeevani manages her husband's chemist shop—aptly named “Sanjeevani Medical Store.” It stands as a quiet but powerful symbol of how timely care can transform lives. Reflecting on her journey, Sanjeevani shares a simple but profound truth: “Vision is important for everyone. Without good vision, you become dependent on others for life, and it becomes a challenge not just for you, but for those around you.”

Her story is a reminder that sight is more than just the ability to see, it is the ability to learn, grow, work, and live independently. And through initiatives like Orbis' school screening programs, many more children just like Sanjeevani can find their world coming back into focus.





Shinu's Story

From darkness
to dignity: A life
transformed by sight.

In the remote village of Ichhapur, Shinu's early life was shaped by poverty and the growing fear of losing his vision. What began as blurred sight soon threatened to take away his independence and his future. But a timely eye screening camp organized by Orbis partner hospital changed the course of his life.

A simple surgery restored Shinu's vision, allowing him not only to see the world clearly again, but also to reclaim his place within his family and community.

In the quiet, remote village of Ichhapur, Shinu grew up in a tribal family that depended entirely on farming to survive. Life was difficult but for Shinu, it was about to become even tougher. At a young age, his eyesight began to fade. The world around him slowly turned into a blur. What once seemed simple—walking through fields, helping with daily chores, recognizing faces—became increasingly difficult.

Day after day, Shinu struggled through a world he could barely see. The fear that he might one day live in complete darkness began to haunt his parents. In a family that depended on every pair of hands to survive,

losing vision meant losing independence— and possibly losing the chance for a normal life. Then, hope arrived in an unexpected way.

A community eye screening camp was organized in the area by Orbis partner, Kalinga Eye Hospital & Research Centre. When Shinu was examined, doctors identified the problem immediately—cataracts had formed in both his eyes.

Soon after, Shinu underwent a cataract operation that changed everything. For the first time in years, the world returned to him—clear, vibrant, and full of possibility. The impact was immediate and profound.

With his vision restored, Shinu could once again walk confidently through the fields, work alongside his family, and contribute to the farming that sustained their livelihood. The boy who once feared a life of darkness became an essential pillar of his household. Years later, Shinu built a life of his own. He married, took on greater responsibilities, and continues to support his parents and siblings with pride.

Today, he lives a life that once seemed impossible—a life of dignity, independence, and purpose. But Shinu's story carries a deeper message. It reminds us that for countless people living in remote communities, access to timely eye care can mean the difference between dependence and opportunity, between darkness and possibility.





Safalta's Story

From silence and stigma
to strength and service.

For Safalta, a young girl from Matigara, life once felt overshadowed by a condition she could not control. Strabismus, or crossed eyes, had forced her to leave school and endure constant ridicule, slowly eroding her confidence and hopes for the future.

Siliguri Greater Lions Eye Hospital, an Orbis partner, reached out to her and counselled her parents. A successful surgery restored not just her eyesight, but also her self-belief allowing Safalta to return to school, pursue nursing, and build a life defined by courage and independence.

Safalta was just seven years old when her eyes began to cross. Growing up in Matigara, the condition gradually made everyday life difficult. Reading in class became harder. But what hurt even more were the whispers and teasing from classmates.

Eventually, the ridicule became too much to bear. At just twelve years old, Safalta dropped out of school. Her confidence was shattered, and her parents were left wondering what the future might hold for their daughter. But concern began to grow among her family and friends. Friends of her father noticed Safalta's condition and worried about her education, her future, even her chances of marriage. Meanwhile, the head teacher of the

school Safalta had left behind remembered her absence. Determined to help, the teacher informed a school screening team of Siliguri Greater Lions Eye Hospital, an Orbis partner.

They patiently counselled her parents, explaining that her condition was treatable and that surgery could correct her eyesight. For the first time, Safalta's family saw a path forward. The surgery was successful. Safalta's eyes were corrected, her vision improved and with it, something far more precious returned. Her confidence.

Safalta went back to school, determined to reclaim the dreams she had once set aside. She completed her education and discovered a new aspiration—to become a nurse. The inspiration came from two places: her grandmother, who had once been a nurse, and the compassionate caregivers she encountered during her own treatment.

Safalta pursued a diploma in nursing and eventually chose to work as a home nurse in Bengaluru, nearly 2,500 kilometers away from her home in West Bengal. Today, she faces the world with confidence and purpose, helping others heal, just as she once did.

Safalta's journey is more than a medical success story. It is a powerful reminder that when timely care meets courage and support, a life once limited by stigma can blossom into one filled with dignity, independence, and hope.



Manoyara's Story

Renewed spirit with greater sight.

In the quiet village of Dhupguri, Manoyara once lived in a world marked by both impaired vision and social rejection. A childhood accident had left her with a traumatic cataract and partial blindness, changing the way people saw her—and the way she saw herself.

But a single moment of timely care changed the course of her life. With support from Orbis International and treatment at a partner hospital, Manoyara regained not only her sight, but also her confidence and purpose.

A childhood accident had left Manoyara with a traumatic cataract in her right eye. The injury caused partial blindness and altered the appearance of her eye. What followed was even more difficult than the physical challenge. Manoyara faced isolation.

Misunderstood and often avoided by members of her community, she grew up battling not only limited vision but also deep emotional scars. The lack of confidence and acceptance made her future seem bleak. Then came the turning point.

During an eye screening camp at Siliguri Greater Lions Eye Hospital supported by Orbis International, doctors finally recognized the condition that had affected her life for so long. The impact was immediate and profound. With her sight restored with surgery, Manoyara's world opened again—not just visually, but emotionally and socially. What once seemed impossible began to feel within reach.

But her transformation did not stop there. Today, Manoyara serves as a community health worker at the Dhupguri Lions Vision Center. In the very community where she once felt rejected, she now plays a vital role in protecting the eyesight of others. Her work includes conducting eye check-ups, guiding patients toward proper treatment, and educating villagers about the importance of eye health.

Where there was once stigma, there is now respect. Where there was once silence, there is now a voice advocating for care and awareness. Manoyara has become a living symbol of resilience—proof that compassion and timely medical intervention can restore far more than eyesight.

Reflecting on her journey, Manoyara often says: "I was given a second chance, and now I want to give that chance to others. Every patient I help is a reminder of where I came from and where I am now."

Joy learned the world not by sight, but by touch. He crawled on all fours across the mud floors of his home, eyes squeezed shut, hands stretched forward, searching for the sound of his mother's voice. Faces were only shadows. The blur was constant, inescapable.

Cataracts were not Joy's burden alone. They ran through three generations of his family, quietly stealing vision, one life at a time. Five members in the same household lived in partial or complete darkness. Every day acts like cooking, working, walking to the well became exhausting negotiations with uncertainty.

Alongside poor vision, the family carried something heavier: the stigma. In a community that did not understand, they were whispered about, labelled "affected", made to feel invisible in more ways than one. Then, hope arrived, gently, but decisively. Vivekananda Mission Asram Netra Niramay Niketan (VMANN) in partnership with Orbis, stepped into their lives with care, skill, and possibility. What had long felt inevitable was finally challenged. One by one, all five members of Joy's family received life-changing treatment. Cataracts that had defined generations were removed. Darkness gave way to light.

Today, Joy goes to school. He walks upright, confident, his world no longer shaped by fear of what lies ahead. He reads, he learns, he dreams with clarity. His mother watches him leave for school each morning, tears welling up, witnessing a future she once feared he would never see. Her gratitude flows quietly to the Almighty, to Orbis, and to the doctors who gave her son something beyond sight.

What others experienced effortlessly demanded constant strain from him. The simplest acts became exhausting negotiations with his own vision. Headaches were frequent. Fatigue was constant. to thin. His parents tried everything they could. But in a place where access to specialised care is limited, help arrived too late.

By Class 9, the strain became unbearable. Abhay dropped out of school—not for lack of talent or ambition, but because seeing itself had become a daily battle. Yet even as formal education slipped away, Abhay never let go of his love for art. Then, a turning point. At Sadguru Netra Chikitsalaya, an Orbis partner hospital in Chitrakoot, Abhay’s condition was finally understood.

What had shaped his entire life was identified, treated, and corrected. The surgery restored something Abhay had never truly experienced before: clear, single vision. For the first time, the world came into focus. With sight came freedom. The constant strain disappeared. Confidence took its place. Abhay returned to painting—not as a struggle, but as a calling. For his family, watching their child struggle with blurred vision was heartbreaking. Refusing to accept and determined to improve the situation, his mother brought him to Vivekananda Mission Asram Netra Niramay Niketan. The cataract surgery changed everything - for the first time, Chayan could clearly see the world around him. But the moment that stayed with him the most was deeply personal; “I could finally see my mother’s smile,” as he recalls “And it lit up my world.”

Today, at 21, Chayan stands on his own feet. He works part-time at Haldia Port, contributing to his family’s livelihood—something he once believed might never be possible. The job gives him dignity, independence, and the quiet pride of supporting the people who stood by him through the hardest years. 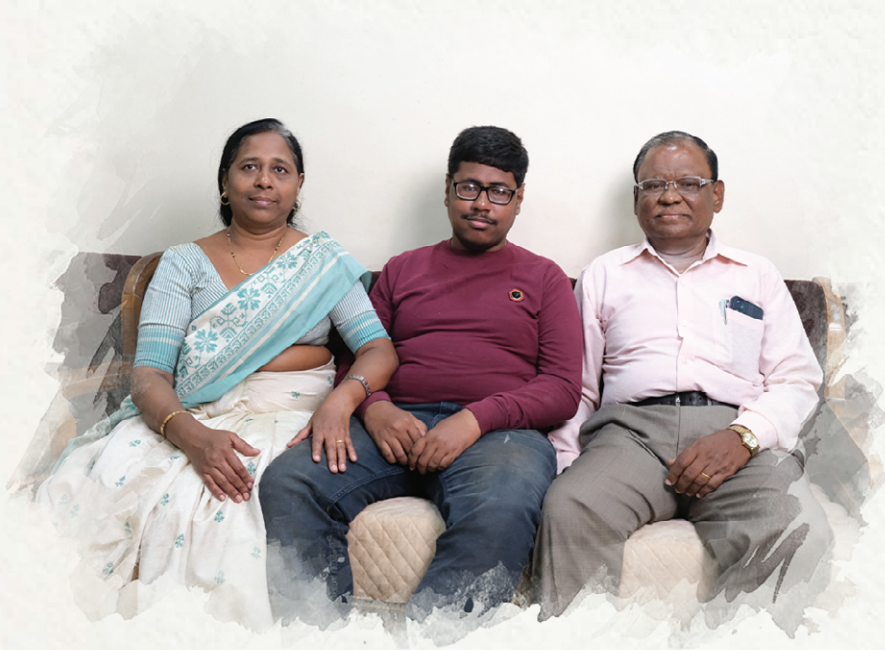

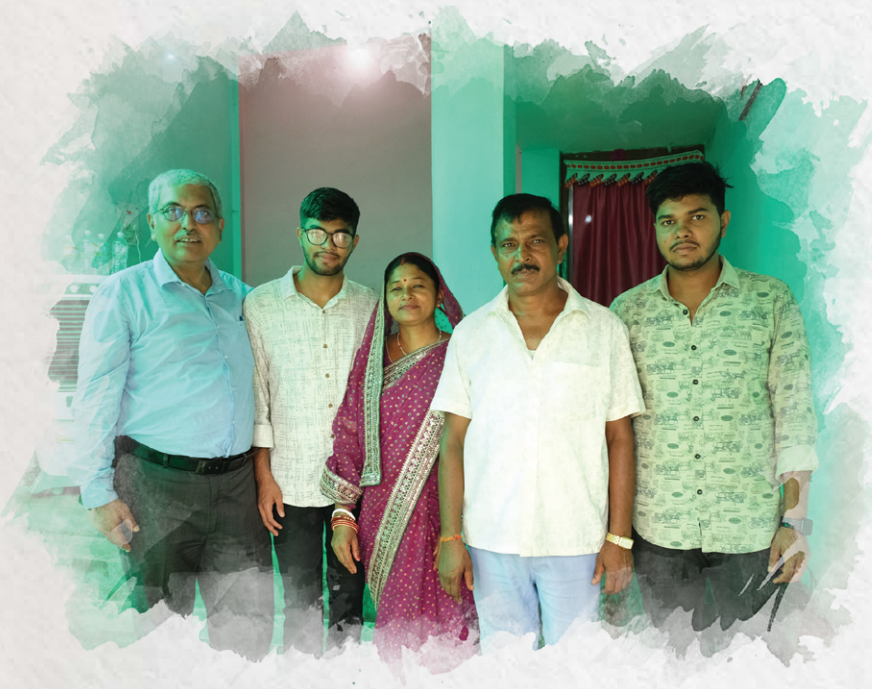
